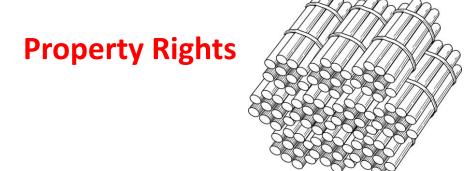


A conservation easement is a

- voluntary legal agreement
- between a landowner and land trust or government agency that
- permanently limits use of the land (covenants are temporary)
- to protect specific <u>conservation</u>
 values, including agriculture

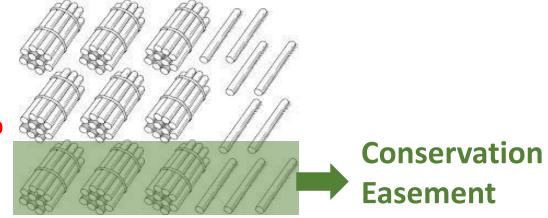
How does a Conservation Easement Work?

Land ownership has certain rights associated with it.



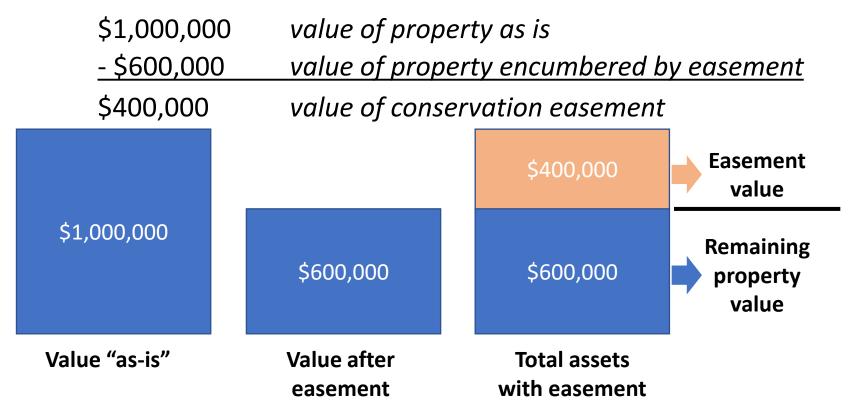
In an conservation easement, a landowner voluntarily sells or donates some of the sticks or rights

Post-easement
Property Rights
(including ownership and right to sell)



Appraisals

Valuation "before and after" analysis



Both for purchases and donations

WORKING LANDS EASEMENTS CAN HELP

Instead of selling off pieces of land over generations, farmers can sell development rights that they wouldn't use anyway.

Selling Land for Cash



Farmland



Farm is divided over generations



Eventually, divided land is developed

Working Land Easement



Farmer chooses easement



Easement protects land, offers financial benefit



Undeveloped land is protected for farming

Why Convey an Easement?

Philosophical Reasons

- Keep land permanently available for agriculture
- Protect from subdivision and development
- Conservation objectives



Why Convey an Easement?

Financial Considerations

- Convert real estate to cash without losing ownership
- Income and estate tax deduction (for donation)
- Reduces size of estate for tax purposes and affordability



Funding Sources

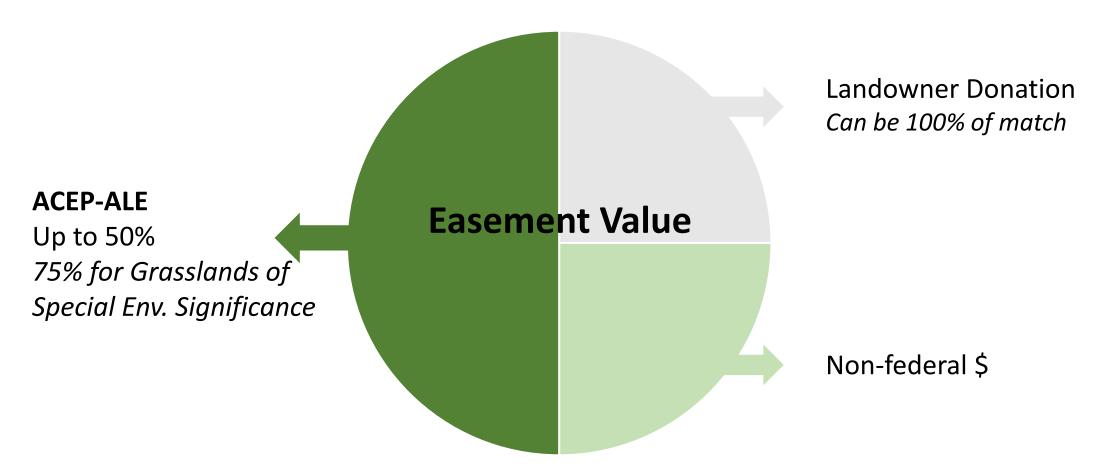
Agricultural Conservation Easement Program – Agricultural Land Easements (ACEP-ALE)

- Natural Resources Conservation Service
- Up to 50% of easement value in most cases
- 75% in "Grasslands of Special Environmental Significance"
- \$450 million / year in 2018 Farm Bill

Agricultural Conservation Easement Program – Agricultural Land Easements (ACEP-ALE)



Funding Sources

Oregon Agricultural Heritage Program (OAHP)

- Up to 75% match
- Designed to integrate with ACEP-ALE
- UNFUNDED
- 28 states with funded match programs have leveraged 3.7 times more federal dollars than those without





OAHP in 2021 Budget

- POP 230 would allow OWEB to receive and expend as grants up to \$5M of non-state public and private sources in support of OAHP.
- No direct funding request from the governor or legislature
- The statute authorizes acceptance of non-state funds; however, donations are not tax deductible



ACEP-ALE in 2023 Farm Bill

ACEP-ALE in 2023 Farm Bill

- 1. Increase funding from \$450M/year to \$1.3B to match demand
- 2. Increase federal match from 50% in most cases to 80%
- 3. Allow ACEP-ALE fund to be used for project costs (staff, appraisals, legal fees, etc.)
- 4. And more!
